The Stratton Red Cross Blood drive will be Friday, October 2nd at the Catholic Church and will run from 11:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

You can make an appointment online at redcrossblood.org or contact Marilyn Lorens at 276-2335. Walk-ins are welcome. Everyone who donates will receive a free Covid 19 antibody test on their blood. There is a mask requirement for this drive. If you do not have a mask, one will be provided. Also, temperatures will be taken before the donor can enter the basement. If it is above 99.5 degrees, you will not be able to donate. There will be no soup served but grab-and-go snacks and water will be available.

To save time donors can go to redcrossrapidpass online to read the information and answer health questions. This must be done on the day of the bloodmobile.



The 2020 Community Fund Drive is underway for 2020.

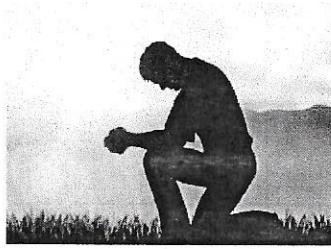

tion:

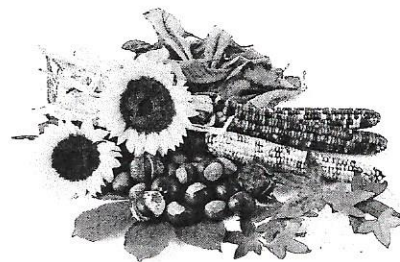
“it shall be unlawful to

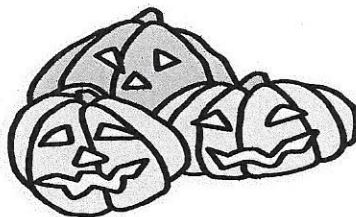
