

DID YOU KNOW ---

The Story of the Bailey Cabin. The cabin, dating back to 1879, was built by C.V. Bailey, the founder of Stratton. Built on land on the very east side of the village, the logs for the cabin were hewn several miles up the Muddy Creek just west of Stratton and pulled by two horses to the building site. The cabin served as the Bailey home as well as a store and later a post office. There are several stories of early life in the Bailey cabin. As C.V. Bailey and his sons Ed, Seymour and Frank were building their log cabin in 1879, several of the area's ranching families warned them of a possible Indian attack and suggested that the Baileys go with them to safety of Indianola, the nearest settlement. The Baileys decided to stay with their half-finished cabin, but they buried most of the store's supplies as a precaution. Not long after a band of 20 to 30 war painted Indians surrounded the cabin. The Bailey's only gun was an old Civil War rifle which had been converted into a shotgun and seemed to have as much back-kick as forward fire power. Charles Bailey decided to try to bargain with the Indian chief. He placed all their flour, sugar and other similar supplies on a blanket and symbolically cut the blanket in half with a hunting knife. He gave one half of the supplies to the Indian leader and took the other half back into the unfinished cabin. This must have satisfied the Indians for they left the Baileys and did not bother them again.

At some time, the cabin was moved east of Stratton. Numerous families lived in it with several additions to the back of the main room. At some point, the outside walls were covered with cement which helped preserve the original logs.

The Little House Museum took on the project, with the help of skilled carpenters Ed Campbell and John Richardson, to bring the cabin back to Stratton. Each log was carefully dismantled, marked and reassembled at its current location next to the Little House Museum. Replacement logs were harvested from the same site on Muddy Creek where the original wood came from.

THE CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

In the book of Ephesians, chapter 5, there is a passage beginning at verse 22 ending at verse 33, about marriage. It tells about how men and women are to conduct themselves for each other through out their marriage. It is an amazing passage and it should be taught to young children from just before they begin to experience puberty until the time they marry. Then look at it occasionally during their time together. There would be a lot less divorce in this country. There is too much content in this passage to put it all here, but there are a couple of things I'll use here and you dig out the rest from the Bible.

Verse 22: "Wives, submit to your own husbands, as to the Lord." Now husbands before you start lording it over your wives, look at verse 21, the proceeding verse. It says "Submitting to one another in the fear of God." Now look at verse 25; "Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ also loved the church and gave Himself for her." Jesus died for His church and for us to be in His church we had to submit to him. Looks like to me, we need to submit to each other.

Verse 33 wraps it up saying this: "Nevertheless let each one of you in particular so love his own wife as himself, and let the wife see that she respects her husband." It takes hard work to make a good marriage and the work never ends. Out of it all, comes a lot of love for each other.
