



What a better way to spend those cold winter nights than with a cozy cup of hot chocolate, topped off some homemade marshmallow.

Homemade Marshmallows

Makes 64 1" square marshmallows. You will need a candy thermometer.

½ c. powdered sugar

½ c. cornstarch

3 packets powdered gelatin (=21 gm or 2Tbsp. + 3/4 tsp.)

1 c. water

1 34 c. sugar

¾ c. light corn syrup

¼ tsp. salt

1 1/4 Tbsp. vanilla



Lightly spray a 9" x 9" baking pan w/ vegetable oil. Sift together powdered sugar and cornstarch and put pan with a spoonful of this mixture. In a large wide mixing bowl, combine the gelatin with ½ cup water and set aside. In a medium saucepan, combine the sugar, corn syrup, salt and ½ cup water. Cook over medium heat until sugar melts, stirring occasionally. Turn heat on high and cook until candy thermometer reads 250 degrees. SLOWLY pour hot mixture into gelatin, beating on low speed with electric mixer. Turn on high, beat 15 minutes, add in vanilla and beat another minute — pour into baking pan. Sprinkle over reserved powered sugar and cornstarch. Set aside for 6 hours or overnight. Cut into 1" squares (cold water on the knife helps) and make sure each one is rolled in the powdered sugar on top. Keep in an airtight container.

Support Your Local Businesses

Imagine your neighborhood or city without any of its small, local businesses - hair and nail salons, corner stores, banks, tire repair shops, lumber yards, gift shops, gas stations, auto repair shops, farmer co-ops and more – all gone.

What would be left? What would the streets look like? Desolate, depressing, empty, boring, abandoned... like a regular day on the zombie apocalypse TV show, The Walking Dead? Just how much of a presence and impact do small businesses have on our communities? The Small Business Administration (SBA) reports 28 million small businesses operating in the U.S. alone. And since 1995, those small businesses have generated 66% of all new jobs in the United States. Small businesses are a big deal.

Small businesses give back (more) to your community

When you support a local business, you're also supporting your town, city, and neighborhood. Businesses pay taxes to the city and county the businesses are located in. Stray to a big box business elsewhere and that money isn't benefiting your community at all. Plus, that tax money is used to support public schools, parks, roads, and sidewalks, as well as fund public service workers, and fire and ambulance departments. What's more, according to Civic Economics, "on average, 48% of each purchase at local independent businesses is recirculated locally, compared to less than 14% of purchases at chain stores.

Small businesses make a major economic impact

As mentioned above, more than half of the U.S.'s jobs since 1995 were created by small businesses. And according to the SBA, since 1990, big businesses eliminated 4 million jobs, while small businesses *added* 8 million jobs. The more you shop at a local store, the more potential job opportunities you could help them provide.

Small businesses provide better customer services

Small business owners strive to survive and one of the biggest advantages they have over large retailers is the ability to provide more personable, hands-on, and memorable customer service.

Small businesses provide greater access to product diversity

Small businesses have just as much access to vendors (who also determine pricing, not stores) that big box businesses do. If a small business doesn't have the products you want or need, ask them – they're also usually much more receptive and willing to order them for you.

Small businesses create a sense of

community

You're much more likely to get to know a small business owner in your neighborhood. According to a <u>study conducted by Trulia</u> and noted in Forbes, the second most popular desire amongst urbanites is a stronger sense of community.

You're going to feel good

You will have the self-satisfaction of helping your friends, neighbors and family instead of nameless faces of bigger towns. *Your local businesses are here for you - please be here for them.*

Chaplain's Corner

I have been doing a Bible study in the book of 1st Corinthians with a gentleman on the internet. The book is a letter by Paul of Tarsus written to the church in the city of Corinth in the country of Macedonia, now modern-day Greece. The population then was about a half a million people and was a crossroad of the east-west trade routes. It was a wild and bawdy city, with a temple to Aphrodite, a fertility goddess, that had 1000 temple prostitutes, male and female. That is an example of what the city was like.

The church was full of born again, spirit filled Christians, but they had their problems. The letter that Paul wrote to them was a letter of instruction of how to run a church. They had lots of troubles in the church; he was helping them with these instructions so they could do a better job of glorifying God.

In the 12th chapter of the book 1st
Corinthians Paul lists 13 gifts given by the person of the God head called the Holy Spirit. The reason they are given is for the Edification, (building up) of the church and to glorify God. There is a lot of confusion in churches today about the gifts some say the gifts passed away when the last Apostle died. Some say that they are all for use today. I'm in the latter camp. I think we need all the tools we can get so we can be a Christian today. Satan has always been an enemy of the church, but now he is laying the groundwork for a much bigger battle to come.

In John Chapter 20 vs 22; it tells that Jesus breathed on them, (the disciples) and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit." This was after the resurrection and at the same time they were saved. In Acts 1 vs 4 He commands them to wait in Jerusalem for the Promise of the Father and then said, "For John truly baptized with water, but you shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now." The word baptized in the Greek means; to be immersed in water or "overwhelmed." For me, being baptized in the Holy Spirit was overwhelming. It made me aware of the power and the love of the Holy Spirit. The evidence of the Baptism of the Holy Spirit is not so much speaking in tongues but love for your fellow man and your God. 
